



## What's in the Medicare Fee For Service Data?

Qualified Entity Medicare Fee-For-Service Data	Part A	Inpatient	<b>\$471 Billion   43 Million Claims</b> Contains claims from acute inpatient stays (and inpatient psychiatric and rehabilitation facilities). The data includes consumer and payer allowed amounts, diagnoses (ICD 9/10), procedures (CPT/HCPCS), length of stay, and provider ID.
		Skilled Nursing Facility	<b>\$112 Billion   21 Million Claims</b> Contains allowed amounts (Medicare and standard payments), submitted charges, beneficiary demographic and chronic condition indicators, resource utilization group (RUG), state of service, and provider identifiers.
		Home Health Agency	<b>\$72 Billion   27 Million Claims</b> Contains Medicare and standard payments, submitted charges, demographic and chronic condition indicators, home health resource group (HHRG), state of service, and provider identifiers.
	Part B	Durable Medical Equipment (DME)	<b>\$35 Billion   270 Million Claims</b> Contains information on prosthetics, orthotics, supplies and services ordered by physicians and other clinicians - includes allowed amounts and Medicare Payment, submitted charges, procedure codes, supplier rental indicator, and provider ID.
		Outpatient	<b>\$236 Billion   646 Million Claims</b> Contains utilization, payment, and hospital-specific charges for ambulatory payment groups paid under Medicare's outpatient prospective payment system. Outpatient stays consist of hospital visits without inpatient facility admission.
		Carrier	<b>\$363 Billion   3,559 Million Claims</b> Contains physician-level payment and procedure data for claims present in files from Part A and Part B (e.g. inpatient and outpatient). This includes place of service information.
	Part D	Prescription Drugs	<b>\$331 Billion   1,445 Million Claims</b> Contains prescription drug event records from Medicare Advantage and stand-alone prescription drug plans - includes provider identifier, prescriptions, brand and generic names, refills, and cost to both payer and out-of-pocket costs.
